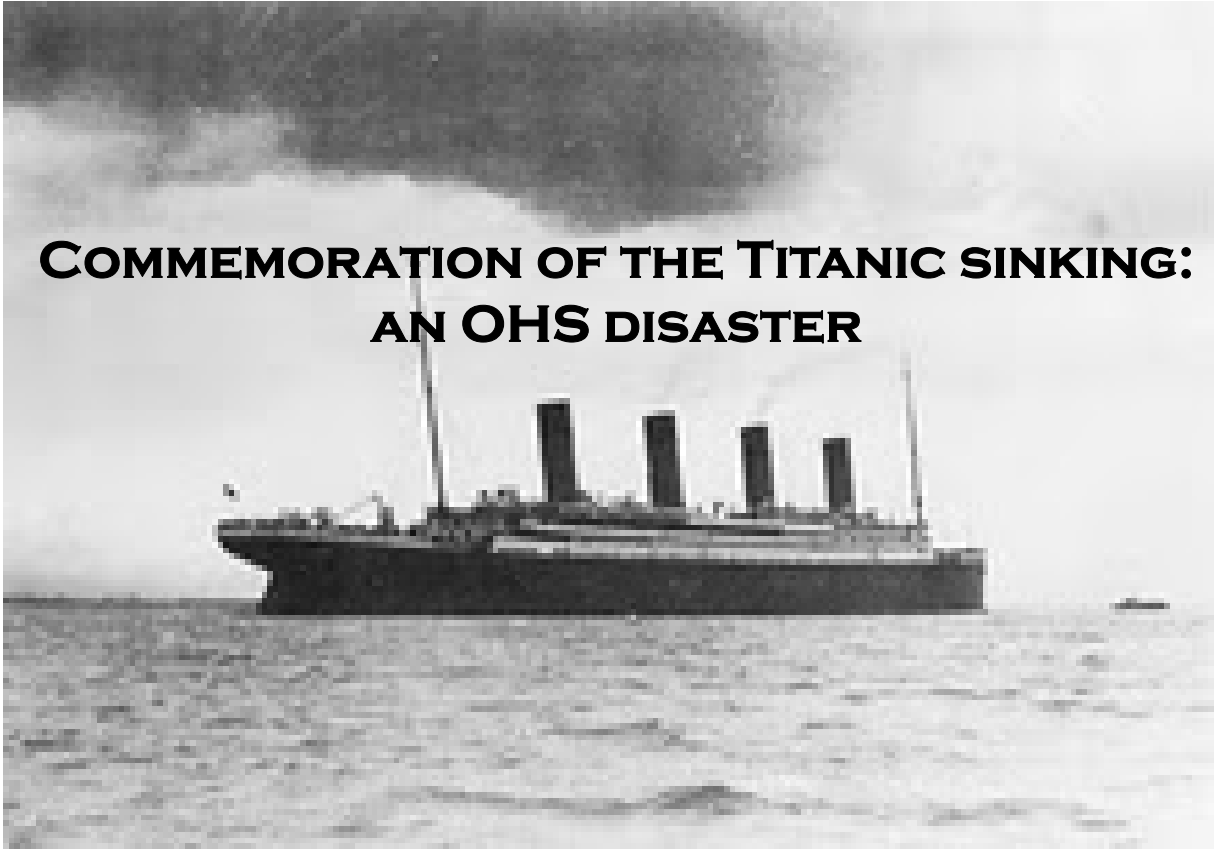

**COMMEMORATION OF THE TITANIC SINKING:
AN OHS DISASTER**



On April 14, RMS Titanic hit an iceberg and sank on its first voyage to New York. While much has been made of the bravery of first-class, male passengers who sacrificed themselves so that women and children might be saved, the survival statistics and the historical record tell a much more complex tale. This event sheds light on some of the myths surrounding the Titanic sinking. We focus not on the lives of the rich and famous passengers, instead commemorating the lost lives of the ship's crew and the effect of the sinking on their families.
